identity and mission

LVIA seeks to promote responsible citizenship based on the principles of solidarity, to act effectively to promote change, to sustain dialogue and mutual understanding among peoples for building a more just and united world. A global society in which the dignity of every person is safeguarded and promoted, in which each individual person may enjoy fundamental liberties, have access to resources and services, have the possibility to live in a healthy environment and improve the quality of life in all aspects; a global society in which every single individual and all communities have the right of self-determination consistent with the cultural rights of other peoples and every man and woman on earth.

LVIA mission

In 2017, to meet the objectives of its mission statement, LVIA operated in 10 Countries of Sub-Saharan Africa, with interventions of development and in response to the emergencies in Burkina Faso, Burundi, Ethiopia, Guinea-Bissau, Guinea Conakry, Kenya, Mali, Mozambique, Senegal, Tanzania and in Italy for the promotion of active citizenship and cross-cultural understanding.

In 2017, the investment in cooperation projects and humanitarian aid amounted to Euros 7,423,091- a quota equal to 95% of the expenditures that achieved factual results in improving life conditions for 333,000 people:

- **17,000 people** (9,000 women and 8,000 men) have better living conditions thanks to development interventions in the **agricultural and pastoral sector**;
- **84,000 people** (44,000 women and 40,000 men) have better living conditions thanks to interventions in **water access and sanitation**;
- **1,800 people** (1,000 women and 800 men) have better living conditions thanks to interventions on **energy provision and the environment**. LVIA operated with local partners mainly on waste management;
- **7,800 people** (4,000 women, 2,500 men and 1,300 children) have better living conditions thanks to interventions of **social inclusion and democratic participation**. Decentralised cooperation between Italian and Burkina Faso communities (which LVIA also followed through in 2017) is part of this category.
- **222,400 people** (142,600 women, 60,700 men and 19,100 children) have better living conditions thanks to LVIA activities against **severe acute malnutrition**

All in all, the resources for **development actions**, equal to **76.3% of the investments in the countries**, have benefitted **100,000 people**; the resources for **humanitarian interventions** equal to **23.7% of the resources**, have benefitted **233,000 people**.

All interventions were carried out taking into account environmental sustainability principles with particular attention to permanent future benefits.


The investment in active citizenship actions in Italy amounts to Euros 94,445 - a quota equal to 1,2 % of expenditure.

Thanks to awareness-raising campaigns, development projects and the activities of the territorial groups, **37,000 people were involved in Italy** with the purpose to garner attention and civil engagement to themes of international solidarity, the promotion of an open and intercultural society and participation in socio-economic change.

LVIA operates in favour of agro-pastoral development by supporting family-managed agriculture, so that subsistence farming can transition to a production capable of creating local and sustainable development.

In 2017 LVIA promoted interventions, which helped to improve food security and living conditions for 17,000 people in rural areas of 6 African Countries.




Water is essential for life. When water comes, life transforms. Water improves life for families, in particular for women; it improves the economy, health, and nutrition; it reduces conflicts. Water is the foundation of sustainable development. From food to energy safety, to human and environmental health, access to water can contribute to the improvement of social well-being and inclusive growth.

In 2017, the interventions promoted by LVIA in Sub-Saharan Africa led to the provision of access to water and hygiene services for 84,000 people in 5 Countries – activities that can be considered both humanitarian work (resilience interventions in response to drought) and part of development action.


L VIA is operating for prevent acute and severe malnutrition in children, the most serious type of malnutrition, which, through the impairment of physical and intellectual development, can cause long lasting damage which the child will have to live with for the rest of his life.

The activities are also focused on the health of mothers and pregnant women, to support them during these delicate periods.

They are to underline the collaborations of LVIA with Medicus Mundi Italia in Burkina Faso (Centre-Ouest Region) and with Doctors with Africa CUAMM in Tanzania.

In 2017, the activities of care and prevention of the child malnutrition involved 222,400 people among which 19,100 children and 142,600 women and mothers in 3 Countries of Africa.

In 2017, LVIA has carried out humanitarian interventions in response to emergencies in Burkina Faso, Kenya, and Mali. LVIA acted following an approach that aims at developing resilience, made possible by certain knowledge of social fabric - in other words, sustainable systems which can generate a positive impact through time.

From this perspective, humanitarian interventions promoted by LVIA possess some traits in common with development projects, as they are careful to generate long lasting results, and also to pursue the priority objective of "saving lives" during emergencies, looking towards building a future.

The humanitarian emergencies in 2017, which jeopardized the lives of thousands of people in already highly vulnerable situations, were caused by the following factors:

- The drought in Northern Kenya;
- Child malnutrition in Burkina Faso;
- Post-conflict damages and child malnutrition in Northern Mali.

In Burkina, it is continued the engagement with the local sanitary system to take care of children affected by acute malnutrition. The intervention has concluded, later almost 6 years, in the Centre-Ouest Region (**more than 57,000 children treated and a rate of mortality gone down under the 1%**), and others have begun in the North of the Country, always with ECHO funds, and whit EU Trust Funds contribution.

A group of women operators has been trained in order to spread **information to mothers in villages on how to prepare nourishing meals only using local ingredients**.




