identity and mission

LVIA seeks to promote responsible citizenship based on the principles of solidarity, to act effectively to promote change, to sustain dialogue and mutual understanding among peoples for building a more just and united world.

A global society in which the dignity of every person is safeguarded and promoted, in which each individual person may enjoy fundamental liberties, have access to resources and services, have the possibility to live in a healthy environment and improve the quality of life in all aspects; a global society in which every single individual and all communities have the right of self-determination consistent with the cultural rights of other peoples and every man and woman on earth.

In 2012, to meet the objectives of its mission statement, LVIA operated in Albania, in 11 Countries of Sub-Saharan Africa (with interventions of development and struggle against poverty in Burkina Faso, Ethiopia, Guinea-Bissau, Guinea Conakry, Kenya, Mali, Mozambique, Senegal, Tanzania and with an action of planning and assistance in Burundi) and in Italy for the promotion of active citizenship and cross-cultural understanding.

In 2012, the investment in cooperation projects amounts to Euros 3,367,989 - a quota equal to 86.13% of the expenditures that have achieved the real results of **improving the life conditions for over 122,000 people**:

- 28,600 people benefitted from rural development intervention in an agro-pastoral context: LVIA operated with local partners for food security and food sovereignty;
- 35,000 people benefitted from interventions in water and sanitation: LVIA operated with local communities for the provision of safe water and sanitation facilities to the villages through development actions, answering the emergency needs and promoting sustainable management of water resources;
- 2,000 people benefitted from interventions of support to education, social inclusion and entrepreneurial training: LVIA operated with local partners with activities of animation;
- 40,600 people benefitted from interventions in Energy and environment: LVIA operated with local partners on waste management and disposal, electrification of rural areas, renewable Energy:

• 16,100 people benefitted from emergency interventions realised by LVIA to answer the tragic famine emergency which affected the Sahel Region.

The investment in **active citizenship actions in Italy** amounts to Euros 95,801 - a quota equal to 2.45 % of expenditure.

Thanks to awareness raising campaigns, education in development projects, the activity of the territorial groups, **35,000 people** were reached with the purpose to garner attention and civil engagement in themes of international solidarity, in the promotion of an open and intercultural society and in direct participation in the dynamics of socio-economic change.

Thanks to the **activities of communication**, LVIA informative activities reached more than **30,000 people**.

Nine French, Italian, Burkinabe and Senegalese regions accomplished activities of decentralised cooperation with the aid of LVIA on plans of local development in Burkina Faso. Sixteen Italian municipalities (of the region of Piedmont) and Burkinabe and Senegalese municipalities have sustained dialogue in the prospect of operating with new projects, currently of difficult realisation because of the imposed cuts and budget constraints to the Italian Communes. LVIA has endorsed its engagement in support of continuity of such relationships.

THE ASSOCIATION

The LVIA, Lay Volunteers International Association, was established in 1966. LVIA is a non-profit membership organisation characterised by an effectual style, seeking effective and innovative means of action, acknowledging the core values and the commitment to volunteerism in all its diversity, working in the spirit of collaboration and solidarity as a belief in professionalism understood as exercise of social responsibility, competence, respect and active civil involvement.

ASSOCIATIVE BASE

In 2012 LVIA was able to count on an associative base composed by 142 members (+8% in comparison to 2011), of which 78 men, 62 women and 1 juridical person, plus 1 honorary and 12 supporting members. The first associative group of LVIA was established in Burkina Faso, Africa; its members count six people: 5 effective members and 1 honorary member (the president of the ASK rural association).

STAFF

In 2012 the LVIA staff in Italy was composed of 18 units, of which 5 men and 13 women. There were 18 expatriates, of which 10 women and 8 men: 8 persons

covered the position of Country Representatives and 10 were employed in development projects. 89% of the expatriated personnel had a university degree. The local personnel was composed of 147 units, of which 22 employed as animators, 25 with a technical role, 5 with logistic duties, 27 with an administrative role, 57 had roles as keepers and drivers, 11 roles of coordination. Altogether, the domestic personnel were composed of 115 men, 32 women and of which 29% with a university degree.

VOLUNTEERING ACTIVITY IN ITALY

In 2012, 246 volunteers carried out volunteering activity with LVIA for a total amount of 10,781 hours.

The educational institutions and institutes of research are stakeholders of LVIA for the innovative technical contributions in the projects.


The **schools and universities** are stakeholders for the realisation of educational modalities of cross-cultural understanding and for furnishing opportunities of training courses.

The donors, foundations, business firms, ministries, embassies and international organisations represent the **economic network** of the stakeholders.


The participatory relationship is developed both with the timely financing of actions and with the elaboration of long-term intervention strategies.







PROJECTS: INVESTMENTS PER SECTOR OF INTERVENTION









One out of seven people in the world suffers from malnutrition, yet the means to defeat hunger are available. On 16 October 2012 the World Food Day was celebrated; FAO devoted the day to the theme 'agricultural cooperatives feed the world' highlighting the necessity to sustain cooperatives and organisations of producers avowing that such institutions, more than the great companies, can contribute to food safety. The work of LVIA in the agricultural and pastoral sector has the approach and the goal to strengthen self-determination of the local communication.


In 2012, the LVIA projects in this sector supported **28,600 people** in Guinea-Bissau, Guinea Conakry and Albania.





water and hygiene



The sixth World Water Forum was held in Marseille in March 2012. Among the associations taking part, LVIA elaborated, with the contribution of international and particularly African partners, a strategic document on the principles and modalities of actions to improve access to water, sanitation and hygiene services (WSH) for the poorest and marginalised groups of the world population. Within the NGO Butterfly Effect international coalition, LVIA drew attention to approaches, matured competences, and promoted appeals related to: • the respect of the local systems of water management; • the preservation of natural resources; • the participated management and responsibility in the governance of water resources, with the recognition of the traditional social institutions in water management; • the necessity of international involvement to provide sanitation and hygiene services still strongly needed in the poorest countries. It is because of these key points that LVIA has accomplished the projects in the water-sanitary sector that, in 2012, supported 35,000 people in Ethiopia, Kenya, Tanzania, Burkina Faso and Senegal.





energy and the environment

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
The green economy as an anti-crisis remedy: the theme for World Environment Day 2012 was "Green Economy: Does it include you?" The U.N.'s programme for the environment defines Green Economy 'as one that results in improved human well-being and social equity, while significantly reducing environmental risks and ecological scarcities. In its simplest expression, a green economy can be thought of as one which is low carbon, resource efficient and socially inclusive'.


On these lines, the projects of LVIA in the environmental sector propose an approach in order to promote processes of inclusion, development and struggle against poverty through means that safeguard the environment in the sectors of renewable energy and waste management. These interventions benefitted 40,600 people in Ethiopia, Senegal, Burkina Faso, Mozambique and Guinea Conakry in 2012.


social inclusion, youth entrepreneurship and long-distance support



The activities accomplished by LVIA are aimed at supporting the **weaker members of society** which, because of social and economic conditions, are living on the margin of society. Such attention is a prerogative of LVIA's mission and it is a component present in all the projects.

In this perspective, LVIA carried out specific activities of animation and social insertion of children and younger under risk situation that live in the poorest and marginalised districts of various African cities with activities to safeguard health and education support through long-distance support and the realisation of local projects. Other activities completed the intervention based on support of women in extreme marginalised position, such as former prostitutes and people affected by HIV/AIDS.

Finally, specific attention was dedicated to **young people** enhancing active citizenship by means of various developmental activities aimed at involving and empowering them to take an active role within the community life; LVIA also supported the setup of business and economic activities as well as social enterprises in the third sector. In 2012 the activities in this sector benefitted **2,000 people** in Kenya, Ethiopia, Mozambique, Senegal, Tanzania and Burkina Faso.








Sahel Emergency



In 2012, over 18 million people in the Sahel region of West Africa were affected by a severe food crisis. LVIA response to the emergency was immediate with food distribution and with the treatment of severe acute malnutrition in children up to 5 years of age in Burkina Faso, one among the most stricken countries of the Sahel region.



BURKINA FASO

THE NUMBERS OF THE CRISIS IN

- More than 2.8 million people affected by the famine
- more than 520 thousand children affected by severe acute malnutrition;
- Less than 150 thousand tons of grain production (19.61% less in comparison to 2011);
- 60 thousand refugees arrived from Mali in the country following the coup d'état.

LVIA RESPONSE TO THE EMERGENCY IN BURKINA FASO

1. Treatment of children with severe acute malnutrition

In 2012, with the funding of ECHO, LVIA and Medicus Mundi Italy accomplished a project that allowed singling out 90% of malnourished children in the districts of Nanoro and Reo, in the Centre-Ouest Region of Burkina Faso. The actions were carried out in a very short time (10 months) given the emergency character of the intervention.

800 community health agents, under the supervision of the nurses of the health centres and the LVIA and Medicus Mundi teams, went to the villages every two months, from home to home, to check on around 100,000 children under 5 years of age and ascertain

risk of acute malnutrition. Almost 3,500 children (over 2/3 of the identified cases) recovered completely and were considered out of danger.

2. Food Distribution

114 tons of food provisions were distributed (sweet corn and millet) to 1,130 families among the most vulnerable in 5 municipalities of Centre-Nord, Burkina Faso (Gorom-Gorom, Yalgo, Tougouri, Nagbingou, Zitenga). The provisions were distributed in warehouses provided by the municipalities, parishes and social services. The list of the beneficiaries for each municipality was established by the state social services, jointly with the town services and the

parishes by taking into consideration the concept of "Vulnerability": poor or very poor people who have no support and without the necessary provisions for daily consumption.

3. Support for the agricultural campaign

The project, with the collaboration of the rural civil society association ASK, fostered the distribution of 3,320 Kilos of seeds of niébé and kapelga (local beans) and sweet corn to 500 farmers. The seeds were distributed by ASK to the producers at a social cost of CFA 1,000 (1.5 Euros).

ASK unites 68 organisations and more than 6,000 producers in the region of the Plateau Central of Burkina Faso.

cooperation between communities

The key elements of decentralised cooperation, which we prefer to call cooperation between communities, are:

TERRITORIALITY, PARTICIPATION, NETWORK

Focused on the territorial players, it involves local expertise in the North and the South of the world in an active participation in the prospect of broadening the collaboration 'network'.

RELATIONSHIP OF RECIPROCITY

The relationship between bodies of the North and the South of the world consists in partnerships, exchange and commitment between related actors willing to face common problems on a local level.

SUPPORT FOR DEMOCRATIC GOVERNANCE

Support for the territories in order to improve policies and local governance, the process of administrative decentralisation, intercultural dialogue and international reciprocity.

LVIA guides, in Italy and Africa, the protagonists of the processes of cooperation between communities (local bodies, associations, young people, etc.) offering technological expertise in terms of project management, know-how and competence, relationship skills and cultural mediation and integration capabilities acquired during its ten year presence in African territories. In addition, in 2012, the severe cuts of budget provision and expenditure imposed on the Italian Local and Regional Authorities brought a drastic reduction of the resources devoted to decentralised cooperation. LVIA maintains its involvement in support of the continuity of such relationships awaiting further funding: • Enndam Network: Municipalities of Piossasco, Orbassano, Avigliana, Villarbasse, Roletto, Airasca, Frossasco, Cantalupa, None, Trana, Pinerolo (Turin) - District Of Gorom-Gorom (Burkina Faso) • Municipality of Fossano - Municipality of Joal Fadiouth (Senegal) • City of Turin - City of Ouagadougou (Burkina Faso).

Moreover, LVIA has managed the actions of the followings projects in Burkina Faso: • Ambiente Piemonte & Sahel: programme guided by the Region of Piedmont. LVIA supported the activities realised in Bogandè, Burkina Faso. • 'Territorial Antenna' Burkina Faso: the Region of Piedmont conferred the coordination of the activities it promoted in Burkina Faso to LVIA. In 2012 LVIA achieved a diagnostic study on youth participation. • 'The regional territorial approach: an optimal space for the realisation of the principles of the effectiveness of Aid'. Regional Authorities: Tuscany and Piedmont (Italy), Rhône Alpes (France), Sahel, North, Haut Bassins, Centre (Burkina Faso), Louga and Ziguinchor (Senegal).



Water is life (Acqua è vita) is the informative and fundraising campaign that LVIA launched in 2003, the International Year of Freshwater, to sensitise civil society on the world water crisis and to guarantee the right and access to domestic/drinking water to African populations that are still deprived of it.

In 2012, LVIA was present at the World Water Forum in Marseille, which opened the doors for the first time to civil

LVIA also participated in the Alternative World Water Forum (AWWF) - in French, the Forum Alternatif Mondial de l'Eau (FAME) - supporting some initiatives of strong and compelling political content, such as a network and the launch of a European Citizens Initiative (ECI) on Water - water as a commons - to acknowledge the right to water in national Constitutions. The documentary film The Well – The Voices of Water from Ethiopia by the directors Paolo Barbieri and Riccardo Russo, produced in Ethiopia with the collaboration of LVIA, has won numerous prizes.



LVIA has sustained the Campaign I too am Italy (L'italia sono anch'io) since 2011; the campaign was promoted on a national level by 22 civil society organisations to uphold a reform linked to the rights of citizenship for young people of foreign origin who were born or have grown up in Italy. In March 2012, around 220,000 signatures were deposited in Parliament: LVIA was active in 7 cities (Forlì, Florence, Palermo, Roma, Latina, Cuneo and Turin) participating in the local Committees and organising awareness raising events and collecting signatures for the petition.
