identity and mission

LVIA seeks to promote responsible citizenship based on the principles of solidarity, to act effectively to promote change, to sustain dialogue and mutual understanding among peoples for building a more just and united world. A global society in which the dignity of every person is safeguarded and promoted, in which each individual person may enjoy fundamental liberties, have access to resources and services, have the possibility to live in a healthy environment and improve the quality of life in all aspects; a global society in which every single individual and all communities have the right of self-determination consistent with the cultural rights of other peoples and every man and woman on earth.

LVIA mission

In 2018, to meet the objectives of its mission statement LVIA operated in 10 Countries of Sub-Saharan Africa, with interventions of development and in response to the emergencies and in Italy for the promotion of active citizenship and cross-cultural understanding.

In 2018, the investment in cooperation projects and humanitarian aid amounted to Euros 6,887,062 - a quota equal to 91% of the expenditures that achieved factual results in improving life conditions for 580,700 people:

- **63,800 people** (27,600 women and 36,200 men) have better living conditions thanks to interventions in the **agricultural and pastoral sector**;
- 64,100 people (33,300 women and 30,800 men) have better living conditions thanks to interventions in water access and sanitation;
- **125,400 people** (70,100 women, 51,400 men and 3,900 children) have better living conditions thanks to interventions on **energy provision and the environment**. LVIA operated with local partners mainly on waste management;
- **108,200 people** (52,900 women, 54,200 men and 1,100 children) have better living conditions thanks to interventions of social **inclusion and democratic participation**. Decentralised cooperation between Italian and Burkina Faso communities is part of this category;
- **219,200 people** (195,000 women, 18,900 men and 5,300 children) have better living conditions thanks to LVIA activities **against malnutrition**.

The resources for **development actions** have been equal to **88.5% of the investments** in the Countries and for **humanitarian interventions to 11.5%**.


All interventions were carried out taking into account environmental sustainability and permanent future benefits.

The investment in active citizenship actions in Italy amounts to Euros 520,483 - equal to 7% of expenditure, involving 52,000 people with the purpose to gain attention and civil engagement to themes of international solidarity and the promotion of an open and intercultural society.

Thanks to communication activities, about **40,000 people** have been involved through LVIA tools and **hundreds of thousands people** through activities with mass-medias.





In 2018, the actions promoted by LVIA and its partners improved food security and living conditions for 63,800 people in 9 African Countries.







BURKINA FASO • 3,700 kg of seeds (niébé bean) and 624 breeding goats



fight against malnutrition

In 2018, the treatment and prevention of child malnutrition involved 219,200 people in 3 African Countries.

LVIA and partners commitment continued in line with previous years, which saw significant interventions in the Sahel (from 2012) and Tanzania (from 2017). Prevention and treatment work is being carried out on acute and chronic malnutrition.

humanitarian work

In 2018, LVIA and its partners carried out humanitarian interventions in response to the emergencies that continue to affect Burkina Faso and Mali.

Humanitarian emergencies are caused by widespread insecurity and conflicts in cross-border areas between Burkina Faso and Mali: the first consequences for population are **food crises** and **malnutrition**.

LVIA intervened with the contribution of ECHO (European Union Office for the Humanitarian Aid) and AICS (Italian Agency for Development Cooperation) to save the lives of children affected by severe acute malnutrition. At the same time, with the support of the EU Emergency Trust Fund for Africa, LVIA has worked to develop **resilience**: sustainable systems that can generate positive impacts over time.



In north of Burkina Faso, LVIA has intensified its efforts to treat malnourished children and prevent the onset of the most acute phase of the disease (nearly 3,000 children), supporting the local health system and conducting village campaigns to monitor the nutritional status.


A paediatric sector was restructured and 4 health centres that had been closed for safety reasons were reopened. Training was provided to nearly 190,000 people: village health workers, community leaders and mothers have been trained on measuring the perimeter of children's arms, a useful and simple technique for continuously monitoring the nutritional status of children.

Vouchers and food were also distributed to nearly 27,000 people, identified as among the poorest in the region.



In Mali, LVIA continued its commitment to the prevention of children malnutrition, including organizing cooking workshops for more than 1,100 pregnant and lactating women who, through training, were able to learn how to cook more nutritious food for their children, simply by making better use of local ingredients: a simple and immediate way to prevent malnutrition.

In addition, 2,400 hygiene kits were distributed to 5 health centres, benefiting 4,800 women and their children, to prevent and better treat complications related to malnutrition.










